# Thoughts of an old curmudgeon, maybe \#9 By Dave Pugh 

I mentioned in my last epistle that I would explain in simple terms the 1968-1970 Canada Straight Edged Commemorative Issues.
My first thought is, if you collect this particular Issue series and you only keep the specimens with four sided perforations, you have missed the mark. You may want to reconsider your keepers for the following 13 issues, as there are stamps for each issue that are scarcer than the perforated items. I do hope I have cleared it up in the following paragraphs.
The thirteen issues were as follows: 482 The Nonsuch, 483 Lacrosse, 484 George Brown, 490 Curling, 493 "ILO" International Labour Organization, 494 Alcock and Brown Flight, 495 Sir William Osler, 499 Charlottetown Bicentennial, 504 Stephen Leacock, 507 U.N. Biological Program, 512 Henry Kelsey, 515 Louis Riel, and 517 Sir Oliver Mowat. All thirteen were printed by the British American Bank Note Company in Ottawa.
During this same period of time there were also straight edge definitives, these particular issues were also printed by BABN and need further explanation, so we are not dealing with them in this article.
The first three issues had perforation of 10.0 and were Canada's first introduction into comb perforations. The remainder of the ten issues had perforations of 12.0 x 12.5 or $12.5 \times 12.0$ depending on the orientation: landscape or portrait.

There was a variety of papers used from plain for most of the issues, to some being printed on dull papers and other on hi-brite papers, and maybe a mix of two during the print run (ILO). The stamps were usually engraved one colour with additional colours added by photogravure where needed. There is no indication that any of the issues were tagged.
Now to the issues themselves, all were issued in panes of $5 \times 10=50$ stamps as


Philatelic Stock

Philatelic Stock or Counter Stock, as mentioned earlier and in either landscape or portrait format depending on the design.
First are the Philatelic Stock with selvage on three sides of the pane, Plate Blocks No. 1 was printed in the selvage at all four corners and these panes of 50 stamps had a single straight edge on one side of the panes always the long side of the stamp, which resulted in five stamps per pane having a straight edge ( $5 / 50$ ) either top or right side, and 45 stamps having four sides perforated ( $45 / 50$ ). This resulted in two different stamps per pane.
Second are the Counter Stock panes of fifty stamps. Each pane had three sides with stamps having straight edges. The fourth side of the pane had selvage and was always on the long side of the stamp, which could be landscape or portrait,

 presentir mad ramp, that all marriages consummated under this license are happy ones, as no $m$ an who marries by my authority will deny his wife anything. Be liberal with your wife. Girls do love a man who buys them everything they want. Man hates a coward and a woman hates a miser. Even if you have to pawn your watch, see that your wife's hat is bigger and better than her neighbors.
