#### Fort Churchill, Manitoba



I was born in Fort Churchill, Manitoba a few years ago. Well I guess more than a few since the armed forces base was closed in 1964 and torn down in 1981. My family was there because my father worked for Defense Research as a Food Chemist, and took the posting for the extra pay for 4 years. When I was 4 months old the four years were up so we moved back to Toronto where he continued to work at DeHaviland Armed Forces Base in Toronto.

It has long been on my bucket list to go back to Fort Churchill to see and experience my birthplace. Well this fall I got my wish and spent 3.5 days in Churchill. (You needn't go for longer because you will see all there is to see in that short time) It was only then that I found out that Churchill and Fort Churchill were two different places 5 miles apart. Churchill is the town and was established as a trading post and became one of Hudson's Bay Companies oldest trading posts. Fort Churchill was established in 1942 by the American armed forces who developed a Strategic Air Command (SAC) base, as a companion to the northern monitoring stations. The large hangers that serviced the jets still exist at the current airport which borders to the south of the old base. The Canadians were there to study survival in extreme weather conditions. My father was working on developing food that was nutritious, palatable and portable for the soldiers.

I remember my dad talking about going out overnight in the sno-cats to experience camping in the snow. Definitely something that does not interest me at all!!! And my mother saying the only person she ever played Monopoly with who cheated was the United Church Minister. Sometimes the snow was so deep that they had to crawl out the second story windows so they could dig out the front door of the building

Some of the things I found really interesting about the current Churchill are:



You are not allowed to lock your front door of your house nor are you to lock your car, they could be necessary safety locations from roaming polar bears in the town. They are protected so the only reason accepted to shoot one is if they are actively mauling someone.

There are signs all around the perimeter of Churchill warning about walking beyond these signs because you are entering polar bear country. My question is.. Do the bears know to keep on the other side of these signs?

Little playgrounds for the children are located everywhere. This is so if a bear comes roaming they do not have far to go to get to a safe place.

If a bear is seen in town there is a phone number to call and a park services person comes out with loud horns and rifles with blanks to scare the bears away. If a bear is persistently coming to town they may have to capture and relocate it

There are so many Tundra Buggy Tour Operators. Where do all the people stay and how do they all make enough money to all stay in business?


