Centenary of the beautiful Norse-American Issue, 1925-2025.

The Norse-American stamps commemorated the 100th anniversary of the arrival of the first group of Norwegian immigrants in New York on October 9, 1825. Two stamps were issued on May 18, 1925, to coincide with the Norse-American Centennial Celebration held in Minneapolis and St. Paul, June 6-June 9.

The 2-cent stamp depicted the sloop 'Restaurationen', which carried the Norwegian immigrants to the United States in 1825. The vignette of the 5-cent stamp is taken from a photograph of an exact size replica of an ancient Viking ship that had sailed from Norway to Chicago in time for the

Columbian Exposition of 1893. The Viking ship is flanked by the shields of Norway and the United States.

The bi-colored stamps were very popular in Minnesota and Wisconsin, states with large Norwegian populations. Because it took the Bureau of Engraving and Printing twice the time to produce two-colored stamps on plates (sheets) of one hundred, the Norse-American stamps have the distinction of having the smallest quantity issued of any commemorative.

SOME GUIDELINES FOR CIRCUIT BOOK SUBMISSIONS

- One country per page, in Scott catalogue number order
- Mint never hinged stamps should be in mounts, ensuring that the stamp does not fall out of the mount by using tape on the edges
- If you are listing higher valued stamps, consider submitting a colour photo-copy of the page this will be shown in the circuit book with the stamps kept in a separate binder held by the circuit manager
- Sets should be mounted in glassines or 102 cards
- Remember there are different page formats for different sized stamps
- Do not submit pages with more than 25% empty squares
- Punch your page for the 3-ring binders BEFORE you mount stamps – we have had stamps with punched holes!
- If using hinges, use the full hinge. Check that the stamp is not stuck down, but also that it is securely attached to the page via the hinge.
- Don't mount large multiples of the same stamp

The Stamps on my Desk by Ralph Wyndham

A great many international covers have graced my desk over the years. I very likely picked this one out of a stamp dealer's box at a show. How could anyone resist a cover bearing such an impressive stamp! (Not to mention the very artistic handwriting in the address.) Mailed in Thailand to a Canadian address, the impressive vessel depicted on the large stamp at the

top is the Thai Royal
Barge, Suphannahong.
The stamp was issued
on November 7, 1996, to
mark the 50th anniversary
of King Bhumibol
Adulyadej's accession
to the throne.

Accompanying the vessel are three copies of a definitive depicting the very king who is carried on the barge on ceremonial occasions.



The earliest mention of the Thai Royal Barge 'Sri Suphannahong' dates back to poems written in 1548. The current Royal Barge was launched in 1911 after its predecessor, launched in 1782, was deemed to fragile to repair. Carved from a single teak log, the vessel is 44.9 metres (146 feet) long and requires 50 oarsmen. According to the website, thailandculturecustomguide.org, "the barge Suphannahong is commissioned as the Royal Barge for His Majesty the King in the Royal Barge Procession on the occasion of presenting robes to Buddhist monks (Royal Kathin Ceremony) at Wat Arun Ratachawararam (also known as the Temple of Dawn). It is also commissioned for other eminent royal ceremonies such as the Royal Ceremony in Celebration of the Bangkok Bicentennial in the year 1982."

Also of interest is the date in the cancellation. Thailand uses a Buddhist calendar as its official date system. This calendar uses the year of the Buddha's 'parinirvana' (death and final nirvana) as its starting point. It is believed that the Buddha's death occurred in the 5th century BC resulting in a dating system that is 543 years ahead of the Gregorian calendar. Thus the date, '11.7.41' (11.7.2541) equates to 'July 11, 1998'.
