## A Common Stamp with a Collecting Twist By Phil Visser

In the curl of the number 5, the number of lines inside the curl is the distinguishing mark. There are four lines in the curl of the 5 in the Die 1 stamp. Naturally the Die 2 will be different, there are five lines present.

Figure 1 shows a very common Australian stamp. It is listed as Scott #319. A note in the catalogue says that there are two Dies of this stamp. Above the listings in Scott's Catalogue is a verbal explanation on how to distinguish Die 1 from Die 2.

Figures 2 and 3 show the visual differences. To search for which particular stamp is in a personal collection, the philatelist needs to use a magnifying glass of 10x power or greater. The differences lie inside the denomination of the 5 pence located in the upper left corner of the stamp.

Not everyone is interested in being so accurate, but for those who seek to be thorough in their collection, this might be of interest. Yet, there is another "twist" to collecting this stamp. This stamp was printed in sheets and in booklets. On the sheet printing, Die 1 was Row A while Die 2 was Row B. This alternating pattern continued throughout the sheet, making it easy to collect since the Dies are

equally printed.

The booklets were printed in three different offerings. They would be part of a booklet of four stamps or a booklet of six stamps. The title states that this is a common stamp. The Seven Sea "Australasian Stamp Catalogue, 2017" mentions that almost 1.7 billion stamps were printed on the sheet stamp format. No information is given about how many booklets were printed. The booklet issue provides the collecting Twist!

For many years collecting stamps with a straight edge was shunned as much as possible. Inspiration arrived and now I also collect the booklet stamps with the straight edges. To do so, the imperf edge can be on both the right and the left side of the stamp. Naturally an example is needed of each type. To complete the booklet offerings, there are also two stamps with two straight edges. The straight edges would be at the bottom of each stamp and also on the right side or left side.

Now try to get them nicely cancelled and well centered!

### The AZAD Hind Stamps

The Azad Hind stamps are a set of prepared but never issued stamps for the planned Provisional Government of Free India under Subhas Chandra Bose. All stamps were printed by photogravure in sheets of 100 at the Reichsdruckerei, the Government Printing Bureau in Berlin.

The "Provisional Government of Free India" was founded by Subhas Chandra Bose as a government in exile with the support of Japan during the Second World War. For this government, stamps were planned, which were manufactured in Nazi Germany. The stamps were commissioned by Bose himself during his stay in Berlin in early 1943.

The stamps were designed by the graphic artist couple Werner and Maria von Axster-Heudtlaß, who designed numerous stamps for the Reichspost and later for the Deutche Post between 1925 and 1949. According to propaganda philately specialist Dave Ripley, the soldiers on the 1+2 rupees stamp represent three of India's best-known freedom fighters at the time. Sukhdev Thapar, Bhagat Singh as standard-bearer and Shivaram Rajguru. They were hanged by the British authorities on March 23, 1931.

1 million copies of each stamp were printed. Exceptions were those planned for the Andaman and Nicobar Islands without surcharge, which were only issued 500,000 times. A very small number were produced of the higher values 1+2 rupees, which exist in three different varieties. Due to the fact that this value was manufactured in a multicolour print, unfinished variants were discovered later. At the end the flag should be illustrated in orange, white and green colours. Unfinished prints in black and black/orange have been preserved. Of the black version the found quantity was 4500 pieces, of the black-orange 2000 pieces and of the final, finished version 7000 pieces. Except for the higher rupees values (only imperforated), all stamps exist both perforated and in practically the same number imperforated. The stamps planned for the Andaman and Nicobar Islands were perforated L 10½.

All other small nominal values were perforated differently, so there were issues with the following variants: L 9½:10½, 10½, 10½:9½ and 11:10½. There are often stamps with irregular perforations.
